Your adventure begins in Adelaide, one of Australia's most elegant and laid-back cities. It's also a city with a serious soft spot for great food and wine, and barely an hour outside of the city you'll discover why: the Barossa and Clare Valley are right on the doorstep.

Follow the sun west and you'll discover Yorke Peninsula – a holiday destination for generations of families who indulge in its beaches – and then you're on the road to the fabled Eyre Peninsula.

Eyre is a region of untamed beauty that extends from Whyalla to Port Lincoln and Ceduna. From Ceduna you enter the Far West and the official start of the Nullarbor. The Eyre and Far West regions are a beguiling mix of rugged beaches, coastal cliffs, ancient geological formations, epic wildlife and more than 100 National Parks – including the Nullarbor Wilderness Protection Area. Don't miss Eyre's many hidden treasures. Stretch the legs with a hike at Carpeppe Hill. The Rooru Trail and Hiltaba Nature Reserve. Discover ancient monoliths including Murphy's Haystacks and Pildappa Rock with its wave formation. And for lovers of the Outback, the Gawler Ranges, with its vast landscapes, is a place to reconnect with nature – and yourself.

Eyre Peninsula is famous for its seafood, producing some of Australia's finest. Take a detour along the Seaford Peninsula Touring Route from Whyalla to Port Lincoln and Ceduna for the ultimate seafood safari – a mix of astonishing scenery and premium produce, including King George whiting, oysters, tuna, prawns, calamari, kingfish, lobster, abalone and mussels.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

TOWN BY TOWN

ADELAIDE TO PORT AUGUSTA

Adelaide combines exceptional food and wine, heritage architecture, lush parklands and pristine beaches. Head out of Adelaide and you'll reach the Barossa and the Clare Valley. From here you can venture to Wallaroo on the Yorke Peninsula and take the ferry to Lucky Bay or continue to Port Augusta.

In Port Augusta, the Watlata Interpretive Centre offers insights into the region's geology, Aboriginal dreaming, Outback explorers and more.

DETOUR: WHYALLA

Take a stroll on Whyalla's unique circular jetty. During winter, Whyalla is home to the world's only aggregation of giant Australian cuttlefish. Contact the Whyalla Visitor Information Centre for tour information.

DETOUR: SEAFOOD FRONTIER TOURING ROUTE
Continue to Port Lincoln, the seafood capital of Australia. Swim with sea lions and cage-dive with great white sharks. Shuck oysters at Coffin Bay and dine on the world's premium seafood. Follow the purple lollypop signs for the ultimate seafood safari. Continue to Ceduna and rejoin the Eyre Highway.

NUTTBUSH RETREAT – PANDURRA STATION

Located 40 kilometres west of Port Augusta, Pandura Station has been owned by the Nutt family since 1895. They offer various styles of accommodation.

THE GAWLER RANGES

The Gawler Ranges encompasses 12,000ha of remote, pristine Australian wilderness, encompassing rocky gorges, red sand, white salt lakes and incredible wildlife (it's one of few places in Australia where three species of large kangaroos can be seen, and is home to over 100 bird species). Access points from Iron Knob, Kimba, Wudinna and Minnipa.

IRON KNOB

Iron Knob is synonymous with the early development of BHP and the birth of the Australian steel industry. Iron ore was discovered at Iron Knob in 1894.

- Mining Museum and mine lookout tours
- Gateway to the Gawler Ranges including Mt Ive Station and Lake Gardiner

KIMBA

Admire the amazing artwork on the local silos, browse the historical museum and camp at the award-winning Kimba recreational reserve.

WUDINNA

Wudinna has a relaxed Outback feel and good general services. The huge granite formations of Mount Wudinna and Turtle Rock are nearby.

MINNIPA

At Minnipa you'll find plenty more rocky outcrops to explore. With its spectacular wave formation, Pildappa is great for a hike and sunsets. Continue along the Gawler Ranges scenic route, or onto Hiltaba Nature Reserve – a little known Outback paradise with abundant wildlife.

- Guided tours of the Minnipa Agricultural Centre • Gawler Ranges Scenic Route
- Camp and hike in Hiltaba Nature Reserve (also accessed from Wirulla)

DETOUR: WEST COAST BAYS

A detour will allow you to explore beautiful bays of the Eyre Peninsula's West Coast. Swim with sea lions at Baird Bay, enjoy the coastal vistas and drives around Venus Bay and Smecky Bay, and taste oysters at Smoky Bay.

- Murphy's Haystacks • Tails Caves and rock pools • Swim with sea lions and dolphins at Baird Bay and visit Point Labatt • The Westall Way and Cape Bauer driving loops • Book an oyster farm tour with SA Premium Oysters at Smoky Bay

CEDUNA

The name Ceduna is a derivative of the Aboriginal word 'Chedonna' meaning 'healing place'. Visit Ceduna Arts to purchase a masterpiece from some of Australia's most talented Aboriginal artists and learn about the spiritual connection Aboriginal peoples have with the land. Visit desertsoosa.com.au for Aboriginal tours and experiences. Visit the Ceduna Visitor Information Centre to pick up your Nullarbor links score card (and rent some clubs). This is your last major commercial hub so stock up on supplies.

- Ceduna Arts • Pinky Point Lookout • Ceduna National Trust Museum

Wildlife? Of course! The region is teeming with all the Aussie classics – kangaroos, koalas, emus and wombats – while twitchers are spoiled for rare birdlife and large raptors including wedge tailed eagles and white bellied sea eagles.

Marine wildlife viewing is among the world's best. Swim with dolphins, leafy sea dragons, sea lions and giant Australian cuttlefish (during winter). The Neptune Islands (off Port Lincoln) are famous for cage diving encounters with great white sharks; and during winter, whales are known to travel to the Nullarbor; they can be seen from Fowlers Bay, Head of Bight and off the Bunda Cliffs.

There's a heavy social stigma to the Nullarbor crossing, to follow voyagers coming the other way, look out like the 1950s and the Nullarbor Links golf course. PENONG

Penong is home to dozens of working windmills, including 'Bruce', Australia's biggest! Take a detour to visit the surf mecca of Cactus Beach and Lucky MacDonnell (which turns pink when algae conditions are right). West of Penong, pull in at Scotescos to see the big wombat.

FOWLERS BAY

A former whaling station until 1943, Fowlers Bay is historic, picturesque and surrounded by sandhills. The stunning bay is a fantastic fishing spot and offers some of the best whale watching in Australia.

- Whale watching boat tours – (July to October) • Sandboarding (BYO board)
- Jetty fishing and surf fishing (Mexican Hat and Scott's Beach – 4WD access)

DETOUR: MARALINGA

In the 1950s the Aboriginal peoples who occupied the Western Desert Areas were forcibly removed when Maralinga became an atomic bomb testing site. Tours of Maralinga operate between April and October; advance booking required. Visit maralingatours.com.au

- Two Day/One Night – Self Drive and Camp Tour. From the Eyre Highway turn onto the Jacinth Ambrosia Mine Access Road. (Leave before the tour)
- Full Day Maralinga Mysteries flying tour with Chintia Air Safaris

YALATA

After Fowlers Bay you'll pass Yalata Indigenous Protection Area spanning over 458,000 hectares. The Yalata Community is closed to the public, a permit is required if venturing off the highway. The region has several (very popular) 4WD coastal camps with fantastic fishing. Campsites must be booked in advance. Visit yalata.com.au

- Camp and fish along the Yalata coast (advance permit required)
- Camp or Stay at the Yalata Caravan Park (cabins and campsites available)
- Buy Aboriginal art at the Yalata Roadhouse
- Look out for camels, wombats and kangaroos' sign, just past Yalata Roadhouse

HEAD OF BIGHT

Head of Bight is a unique mini desert of towering sand dunes and coastal cliffs. The cliff-top boardwalk and viewing platforms offer remarkable views round of the Bunda Cliffs, and from June the waters below become a southern right whale nursery, providing some of the best land-based whale watching in the world. The Interpretive Centre is a wealth of information, well worth a stop year-round.

A reduced entry fee is offered in non-whale season. (Yalata permit is not required).

NULLARBOR ROADHOUSE

From Head of Bight, you'll enter the Nullarbor Wilderness Protection Area and the start of the Treeless Plain. Stay and play at the Nullarbor Roadhouse, explore the Murrawjinie Caves and take a scenic flight over Head of Bight and Bunda Cliffs.

THE NULLARBOR WILDERNESS PROTECTION AREA (WPA)

The WPA covers almost a million hectares and affords the highest level of environmental protection in SA. These are the ancestral lands of the Murring, Far West Coast Aboriginal Peoples who help manage the significant cultural, environmental and geological values of this area. They are a very welcoming people and ask that you respect the WPA by keeping to tracks, observing signage and leaving everything as you found it. Travellers are able to detour from the highway to view the Murrawjinie Caves, Koonalda Homestead and Koonalda Cave. Caves on the Nullarbor hold great cultural significance and entering caves is not permitted without a permit (except the Murrawjinie Caves). Camping within the WPA is by permit only; Koonalda Homestead camping can be booked online at parks.sa.gov.au. Camping is also available within signposted roadside stops and rest areas adjacent to Eyre Highway One.

WA/SA BORDER VILLAGE

- Border Village International Signpost and 'Rooney II' statue
- Look for the dotted SA/WA border lines • Wilson's Bluff Lookout
- Plaque commemorating Eyre's and Wylie's Nullarbor crossing in 1840–41

PERTH TO NARROGIN

Narrogin is home to one of WA's newest national parks, Dryandra Woodland National Park. The park is home to the largest remnant of native vegetation in the western Wheatbelt – a valuable and diverse conservation area with great walking trails.

KALGOORLIE

Kalgoorlie / Kariakuta Boulder and the Goldfields offer a real Australian Outback adventure and a fascinating insight into the region's colourful gold rush history. The towns and small communities of the Goldfields were built on the hopes and dreams of fortune-seekers who flocked to Western Australia following the discovery of gold in the 1890s. Life was tough for these early gold diggers, who bravely faced the challenges of the living in the Outback. But while multimillion-dollar mining corporations have replaced the smaller gold prospecting operators, and Kalgoorlie Boulder has been transformed into a modern cosmopolitan town, reminders of the 'wild days' are everywhere you look.

Soak up the rich gold rush history with a road trip along the captivating Golden Quest Discovery Trail. Journey through rich red landscapes, Outback pubs, historic hotels, active gold mines and some of the region's most alluring ghost towns. The Golden Quest Discovery Trail is an iconic road trip itinerary you don't want to miss.

NORSEMAN

Norseman is a historic gold mining town and Western Australia's gateway to the Nullarbor. Legend has it that a prospector named Laurie Sinclair tethered his horse 'Hurdy Norseman' to a tree overnight in the 1890s. By morning, the horse had unearthed a piece of gold-bearing quartz by pawing the ground. Over five million ounces of gold have been mined out of Norseman, making it the second richest goldfield in WA. Norseman is also one of the Granite and Woodlands Discovery Trail, a 300-kilometre unsealed road from Norseman to Hyden with excellent interpretive signage and some of Australia's most pristine woodlands. Norseman offers a range of services and facilities for travellers. Don't miss:

- Beacon Hill Lookout and Walk Trail. A 360° panorama of town and surrounding bushlands
- Tin Caskets and the statue of Norseman
- Dundas Coach Road Heritage Trail
- Get your Nullarbor crossing certificate from the Tourist Centre
- Genstone fossicking, ancient Dundas Rocks and Bromus Dam picnic area
- Traversing through the Great Western Woodlands – the largest unfragmented temperate woodlands left in the world. Twice the size of Tasmania, it holds a staggering 20 per cent of our country's plant species

DETOUR: ESPERANCE

Ensure you make time for a visit to Esperance, home of Lucky Bay, crowned 'World's Best Beach 2023'. Esperance is a picturesque coastal town with Australia's whitest sands, striking turquoise waters and wild landscapes making it one of the most visually captivating places in the country.

The Recherche Archipelago is made up of a necklace of more than 10 islands and islets, adorning the coast of this beautiful region. There are many spectacular attractions and tours including:

- National Parks. There are six in the area with Australia's whitest beaches, flora and fauna and camping facilities. Drive yourself or take a 4WD tour
- Wildlife cruise of the bay. Observe sea lions, sea eagles, dolphins, whales (June–October) and many species of birds such as the rare Western Cape Barren geese
- Woody Island, ultimate overnight and day trip adventure
- The Great Ocean Drive. Discover the Wireless Hill Lookout, Twilight Cove, historic Observatory Point and wind farms
- Fitzgerald River National Park. Over 1600 species of wildflowers

BALLADONIA

Loosely translated, 'Balladonia' comes from the Aboriginal word meaning 'big red rock'. Balladonia made world headlines in 1979 when space debris from Skylab landed 40 kilometres east on Woorib Sheep Station.

- Cultural Heritage Museum, featuring computer-controlled interactive technology to recreate the area's history (Balladonia Hotel complex)
- And Desert Woodland (counted among the world's oldest and most dense landscapes)
- Newman Rocks is a popular spot for a break from the long black strip (one kilometre off road)

CAIGUNA

The stunning Baxter Cliffs are named after Edward John Eyre's overseer, John Baxter, who lost his life on 29 April 1841. The '90 Mile Straight' from Caiguna to Balladonia is the longest straight stretch of highway in Australia (146.6 kilometres).

- Caiguna Blowhole half a kilometre west of Caiguna (follow the signs)
- Caiguna's longest straight road' sign (photo opportunity)

COCKLEBIDDY

Originally established as an Aboriginal mission in early pioneer times, it is a nature lover's paradise.

- Chapel Rock formation and picnic area, located four kilometres east of Cocklebyddi. Look for a track on the side of the road
- Twilight Cove is a popular fishing and whale watching spot, 32 kilometres south of Cocklebyddi (4WD track)
- Eyre Bird Observatory (approx. 50 kilometres south of Cocklebyddi) Phone (08) 9039 3450
- Spectacular Baxter Cliffs and Nuytsland Nature Reserve are located south-west of Cocklebyddi by way of a rough 4WD track. Check road conditions locally

MADURA

Midway between Adelaide and Perth, Madura Station was settled in 1876 and bred horses for the British Army (India).

- Madura Pass has spectacular views of the Roe Plains and views towards the Southern Ocean from the lookout at the top of the pass

MUNDRABILLA

Descending from the Nullarbor Plain, via scenic Eucla Pass, Mundrabilla has regular services for the traveller.

- Australia's biggest meteorite was discovered nearby, weighing over 10 tonnes

EUCLA

In the early 1900s, Eucla had a population of over 100 and was the busiest telegraph station in Australia beyond the capital cities.

The Eucla Telegraph Station opened in 1877 and helped link WA with the rest of Australia and the world, sending 11,000 messages annually (just 33 years after Samuel Morse invented the telegraph). The first message sent to Perth on 8 December 1877 stated 'Eucla line opened. Hurrah!'

- Old Telegraph Station runs four kilometres south of highway
- Museum and Bureau of Meteorology
- Golf course
- Eucla National Park and Delisser Sandhills (4WD recommended)

DETOUR: FOREST

Pronounced 'For-rest', this old railway siding and settlement is 121 kilometres north west of Eucla. It was established in 1916 during construction of the Trans-Australian Railway. A true taste of remote living, Forest is visited after four hours driving on an unsealed road.

- Rock-hop in 4WD
- Fuel, accommodation and camping. Refer to forrestairport.com.au

There is a quarantine checkpoint at WA/SA Border Village for traffic entering Western Australia and at Ceduna for traffic entering South Australia. Fruit, vegetables and certain plant material will be confiscated. Travellers should be well prepared with food, water, fuel and communications to travel in remote areas. Always drive to road/track conditions and let people know your travel plans.

RESPONSIBLE TRAVEL

Travelling the Nullarbor is remote Australia at its best but the journey shouldn't be undertaken without a bit of planning. These tips will help you travel safely and responsibly.

Stay in contact: Mobile coverage is limited to roadhouses. Plan fuel, food and rest stops ahead and download Emergency+ or take other communication.

Check road conditions: Outback road conditions can change quickly depending on the weather. Adhere to warnings and seek local advice.

Avoid driving at night: Prevent wildlife fatalities (and damage to your car) by avoiding driving between dusk and dawn.

Respect culture: Please be respectful of the Aboriginal peoples and communities that call the Nullarbor home. Do not enter Aboriginal countries or lands without permission.

Camp only in designated areas: Where possible book your campsite in advance. Visit eyrepeninsula.com/camping

Keep on track: Protect the fragile ecosystems by keeping to designated tracks.

Beware of unstable cliffs: Undercut cliffs are a safety hazard. Obey signs and keep a safe distance from cliff edges.

Give wildlife space: For your safety and theirs, don't get too close. Maintain the legal distance from whales, dolphins, and seals.

Think beach safety: Beaches along the route are NOT patrolled. Be aware of swells and rips.

4WDs on beaches: Ensure you are equipped and can get yourself out of trouble. Check tides, and don't drive on vegetation or above the high tide line.

Vehicle hygiene: Vehicles driven off-road spread weeds that can destroy local ecosystems. Wash your vehicle frequently.

Drone usage: All drone operation in and over National Parks, including the Nullarbor Wilderness Protection Area, is illegal.

Check for fire bans: If it is safe to have a fire, bring your own firewood.

Be mindful of waste disposal: Plan toilet stops and use designated dump points. Carry your rubbish, and deposit in bins provided at rest stops and roadhouses.

Download the Nullarbor map before you go: Visit nullarbormap.com.au. Follow the automatic prompts on an Android phone. Select 'Add to Home screen' on an iPhone. Install on a computer using Chrome – Click the three dots top right and Install 'Nullarbor Map'.
